If you observe something out of the ordinary, you should phone the police call centre on: 33 64 64 64 Whilst your NHW zone co-ordinator is interested in what happened, they are not able to assist. The police should be involved at the earliest opportunity to secure the best result.

Fraud Squad

An interesting and informative presentation by Detective Sargent Frank Vines of the Police Fraud squad. Detective Vines spoke about the increasing occurrence of identity theft and how you can avoid becoming a victim of this crime:

- Padlock your mailbox. Thieves read your financial correspondence (bank statements), then falsely use your identity. A cheap padlock is often enough to deter a criminal.
- Lock your car and remove valuables. Also remove items of identification from view.
- Beware of spyware programs when using the internet. Keyboard loggers can record all your key-strokes and report back to a central site, tracing your Internet banking details.

The cost of fraud to banks and insurance companies is passed back to the consumers.

Be a hero, know Triple Zero

It is a phone call that we all hope we never have to make, but if you do need to dial triple zero for an emergency, it is a very simple procedure.

Children as young as two have called '000' when an adult has been in trouble. Sometimes they may be the only person able to get to a phone to call for the ambulance, so teaching young children triple zero can save a life.

If you call triple zero, you will get through to a Telstra operator who asks which town and state you are calling from and which service is required - fire, ambulance or police.

Acting Sergeant Sue Zealey from Petrie Police Station said if Police were required, a Queensland Police Service call taker receives the call .

The call taker advises the caller that Police are being dispatched and sends information to the Police communications centre, either manually or by computer. The call taker then asks additional questions to determine any other information needed by the crew,

A recent survey conducted for the Department of Emergency Services last year showed up to 50,000 Queensland adults do not know the triple zero emergency phone number.

26,700 people in the survey did not have any idea of the triple zero number, and a further 25,600 people who said they knew the emergency number actually gave an incorrect number - such as an overseas emergency number.
